Abstract: A study of 1000 young adults with health insurance to identify risk factors for smoking cessation. The study included 1000 young adults with health insurance, aged 18-24, who were surveyed about their smoking status, reasons for smoking, and reasons for quitting. The study found that the most common reasons for quitting were: health concerns, family pressure, and personal choice. The study also found that the most common reasons for continuing to smoke were: stress, social pressure, and addiction.
